Thomas Swindle, who had been in bad health for some time, died Sunday at the advanced age of 93 years, 3 months and 20 days, and was the oldest man in the county. Mr. Swindle was born February 9, 1811. He professed religion in July or August, 1843, and joined the M. E. Church in 1844. In the division to which he belonged, the M. E. Church, South, he was licensed to exhort somewhere in the date between 1850 and 1860, and was faithful to the trust until his death, being a devoted servant of God for more than 60 years. He was first married to Mariam Anderson January 15, 1833. To that union there were twelve children, eight of whom lived to be grown and four died in infancy. His second marriage was with Mrs. N. F. Harris, December 7, 1873, who survives him. In 1867 he received the degrees of F. and A. M. at Camden Lodge No. 179, of which he died a member. The burial took place at the Shiloh Cemetery Tuesday with all the honors of Masonry, and was attended by a large gathering of friends and relatives.
